  - Feelings over reason
  - Faith in inner experience and imagination
  - Sees civilization as artificial and distancing
  - Values freedom and the individual
  - Celebrates nature as redemptive and inspiring
  - = Intuition, Imagination, Innocence, Inspiration, Inner-self, Individual

- Dark Romantics
  - Contemplate natural world
  - Symbolism in human events
  - Innate depravity of humans
  - Examines effects of sin and guilt
  - Wild haunted landscapes
  - -Supernatural elements

- Portrait of 1850s America
- General
  - Age 40 life expectancy (also married by now)
  - -17 million / 3 million black = mostly rural
- New York City
  - No garbage collection Dead animals and feces in streets
  - -20,000 homeless kids
  - -Tenements = 400 people to 1 toilet

- Transcendentalism
  - Go beyond everyday experience of physical world – denies history and tradition
  - Seek reality beyond perception only a fragment of truth – social norm is one way
  - Individual soul part of Over-soul we have a piece of god in all of us – God exists all places
  - Native Mysticism natural act = spiritual fact find metaphors in nature
  - Focus on individuality, finding of self, living by personal code, following own path

- Realism
  - Post Civil War
    - 625, 000 Dead
    - Battle of Westport = 30,000 / 3,000 Dead
  - Depict life without idealizing
  - Analyze social relationships
  - Concentrate on contemporary life
  - Uses vernacular = common and utilitarian language
  - Create portrait of landscapes and people, like fashions and manners

- Naturalism (Extension of realism)
  - Dissect human behavior in specific situations
  - Explore sociology and psychology objectively
  - Behavior determined by heredity and environment
  - Examines humans in relationship to nature
  - Juxtapose human pretension versus universe indifference
