PATTERN 5:

A SERIES OF BALANCED PAIRS

(note the rhythm)

A and B , C and D , E and F

(may be in any slot in the sentence)

Explanation

This pattern has a series of pairs—two or three or four, with a conjunction between the items in each pair. This construction creates a balanced rhythm, but how can you tell if this rhythm is right for your sentence? Read the sentence aloud; listen to the *rhythm*, which is the important feature. As you read, ask yourself: Does your sentence have an orderly progression? Are the items balanced against each other? Do you like the way the paired words sound together?

NOTE: You can use other coordinating conjunctions besides *and* and *or*. See the fourth example below.

Examples

The textbook clearly showed the distinctions between prose and poetry, denotation and connotation, deduction and induction.

Great artists often seem to occur in pairs: Michelangelo and da Vinci, Gaugin and van Gogh, Monet and Cézanne.

Antony and Cleopatra, Romeo and Juliet, Tristan and Isolde, Lancelot and Guinevere were all famous lovers in literature.

Eager yet fearful, confident yet somewhat suspicious, Jason eyed the barber who would give him his first haircut.

(This is a variation of the pattern.)
